## **Canine Ladder of Panic**

The escalation from fear and avoidance behaviors to escape and self-injury behaviors

Dogs will show signs of panic when they cannot escape or aggress against the threat. The adrenaline effect on the body during panic can cause serious damage to the heart, intestinal track, and body therefore, it is important to provide medication to decrease panic attacks, especially when the signs of shaking, trembling, and pacing

Escape despite pain bloody nails, broken teeth, jumping out of windows
Pacing from room to room
Jumping on and off furniture
Digging repeatedly— threshold, window
Shaking, trembling, or pacing
Head down, tail tucked under, curled up
Head lowered, ears down, tail down
Walking away, laying against wall/ furniture
Turning around, pulling the body in
Turning away, sitting down
Yawning, blinking, licking

The speed of escalation is often like the canine ladder of aggression - .2 seconds between each step. Sally J Foote DVM, CABC-IAABC, LSHS-C
